


EPIPHANY LESSONS CAROLS

SUNDAY JANUARY 14, 2024 5:00 pm

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH, CHESTNUT HILL



Welcome to St. Paul's. This afternoon's service is based upon the Services of Advent or Christmas Lessons and Carols so familiar to many, but the lessons quickly move past those seasons into the events and symbols represented by Epiphany, particularly that of light, and Christ as the Light of the world.

The service begins with the church dimly lit, to provide a time for meditation. Following the prelude, the choir begins the service with the Introit, sung from the rear of the church, to the accompaniment of the tower bells. We ask that you stand immediately after the Introit and, following the Bidding Prayer, the choir begins the hymn. As the service proceeds, more light is brought about with the

lighting of additional candles. We invite the congregation to stand and heartily join in singing all the hymns as listed, found in the blue *The Hymnal 1982* in your pew, and to carefully follow the texts of the anthems as they are sung by the choir for a better understanding of the message of the texts, made more powerful by the music to which they are sung.

THE BIDDING PRAYER

BLOVED in Christ, let us now hear in Scripture and song the message of how the Light of the World came to us for our salvation. Let us hear the story of the loving purposes of God from the words of the prophet Isaiah to the story of the Transfiguration of our Lord.

Lastly, let us remember before God all those who rejoice with us, but upon another shore, and in a greater light, that multitude which no one can number, whose hope is in the Word made flesh, and with whom in the Lord Jesus we are one for evermore.

These prayers and praises let us humbly offer up to the Throne of Heaven, in the words which Christ himself taught us:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name;

thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. Amen.

Then I said, "I have labored in vain, I have spent my strength for nought, and in vain; yet surely my judgment is with the Lord, and my work with my God." And now, saith the Lord that formed me from the womb to be his servant, to bring Jacob again to him, "Though Israel be not gathered, yet shall I be glorious in the eyes of the Lord, and my God shall be my strength." 

Jesus is manifested in the first of his signs at Cana in Galilee.

HE third day there was a marriage in Cana of Galilee; and the mother of Jesus was there: And both Jesus was called, and his disciples, to the marriage. And when they wanted wine, the mother of Jesus saith unto him, "They have no wine." Jesus saith unto her, "Woman, what have I to do with thee? mine hour is not yet come." His mother saith unto the servants, "Whatsoever he saith unto you, do it." And there were set there six waterpots of stone, after the manner of the purifying of the Jews, containing two or three firkins apiece. Jesus saith unto them, "Fill the waterpots with water." And they filled them up to the brim. And he saith unto them, "Draw out now, and bear unto the governor of the feast." And they bare it. 
